Message from the Executive Director

In 2022, the AGA was happy to once again offer a full program of exhibitions, events and activities for audiences in Edmonton and across Alberta. We once again welcome school audiences to in-gallery school tours, connecting students to AGA exhibitions, local artists and our tri-lingual education programming.

We opened 2022, with *Inheritance*, an exhibition that examined how events in history continue to reverberate through time, impacting both the present and future. The artists in the exhibition, Deanna Bowen, Steven Nunoda, Adrian Stimson and AA Bronson, explored familial connections to the histories of the anti-Black racism in Alberta, the internment of Canadians of Japanese descent across western Canada and the ongoing tragedies resulting from the Indian Residential School system. Their works seek to hold us true to the past as the only way to move forward.

In February, we featured an exhibition of one of Canada's most beloved folk artists, Maud Lewis, who was famous in her lifetime for her brightly coloured and endearing paintings of rural Nova Scotia. Working from her cabin on the side of the highway in Marshalltown, in Digby County, she produced hundreds of small works that captured aspects of country life that was rapidly changing. This exhibition was complemented by one that featured the work of Edmonton folk artist Sidney Kelsie, entitled *Right in Your Own Backyard*. When Sidney Kelsie retired from working as a house painter in 1979, this Edmontonian became an artist. He began to cut out decorative shapes in plywood, paint them with house paint and place them on his house, fence and in his yard. Soon Kelsie's decorated home near Commonwealth Stadium became a local landmark that attracted many with its dizzying display of visual delight.

In April, the Poole Centre of Design featured the exhibition *Water Wise / River Breath: Re-framing Design's Role with Water*, which was curated by Amery Calvelli, Adjunct Curator of the Poole Centre of Design, to focus on two river watersheds nearly 8,000 kilometres apart - the glacier-fed North Saskatchewan River and the river basin of the Amazon River in South America. The exhibition featured works by Edmonton artists Tanya Harnett and Lana Whiskeyjack with architect Wanda DallaCosta amongst others.

May brought together the two major solo exhibitions: *Manuel Mathieu: World Discovered Under Other Skies* (organized and circulated by the Power Plant Contemporary Art Gallery, Toronto) and *Curtis Talwst Santiago: Pay de Devil – Brang! Brang! Pay de Devil*, curated by Lindsey Sharman. These two powerful exhibitions of paintings, provided thought provoking images of different aspects of Caribbean culture, through insights into the experiences and histories of Haiti and Trinidad

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The exhibition *Comic Sans* focused on the limitless artistic side of Canadian comics and celebrated a broad range of approaches to storytelling. The works in the exhibition expanded well beyond the constrains of a standard page and celebrated the endlessly creative medium of graphic narratives. The exhibition was curated by Lindsey Sharman with Chris Reyns-Chikuma.

Throughout the year, the RBC New Works Gallery featured three exhibitions of Alberta artists: Alana Bartol and Bryce Krynski: all roses sleep (inviolate light); Byron Samson: Place of Honour and Riaz Mehmood: Ghazal - Songs for Home. In the Main Hall, we also featured a new installation by Tiffany Shaw, entitled Edmonton River Valley, which was on view from March to November.

In the fall, the exhibition, *Scents of Movement, Scents of Place* used smells as artworks and included scents that relate to travel, migration, immigration, navigation, and transportation. The exhibition includes scents from very specific times and places as well as smells of imaginary, otherworldly and mundane places. In this way, *Scents of Movement, Scents of Place* touched on broad notions of life, death, myriad world views, subjectivity, colonization and what we can know through our nose.

At the end of the year, we featured *Conjured Images: Spirit Photography from the Turn of the Century*, that highlighted early examples of spirit photography, photos that feature ghostly apparitions whom photographers and sitters claim were not physically present in the room when the photos were taken. Some believed these figures were the spirits of dead loved ones and claimed to recognize friends and family. Others blamed trickery or phenomenon such as double exposures. Spirit photography was incredibly popular at the turn of the 20th century and its popularity coincides with the rise of the spiritualist movement.

Maintaining and building the collection are central to the core mission and mandate of the AGA, as the collection is a public resource that we hold in trust for the people of Alberta. In 2022, we featured two major exhibitions of works from the collection. *BeHolden*, was an exhibition whose title was both a call to action, "Behold" and was a reference to how beholden we are to the many people and organizations who have given to the AGA to support the growth of the collection. The works in this exhibition illustrated the diversity of works of art that the AGA acquired over the last several years, with works that support our core collection of historical Canadian art, and others that expand the representation of contemporary artists and media.

The second exhibition, *ROAD TRIP*, was generated from our experience over the last two years, living through a pandemic in which the only safe way to travel was in a car with only your closest family members. The exhibition included a wide selection of works, featuring images of the highways, hotels, campgrounds, cafes and landscapes one might see we see along a cross country road trip.

In addition to exhibitions presented at the AGA, George Littlechild's profound exhibition, *Here I Am Can You See Me*, that was curated by Adjunct Curator of Indigenous Art, MJ Belcourt Moses, It went on tour following its close at the AGA in March 2022, and was presented at the Art Gallery of Grande Prairie (from April 7 - July 11, 2022) it will tour to venues across Alberta and internationally until 2025. We also continued to tour exhibitions across North Central Alberta, as part of the Alberta Foundation for the Arts Travelling Exhibition program.

In 2022, we also began implementation of the new 3-year Strategic Plan for 2022-2024. The Strategic Plan has community engagement at its core and incorporates the feedback we received from a wide range of individuals, organizations and communities. In 2023, new initiatives included programs such as community markets, seniors' programs, community-led tours and partnerships with new arts partners.

2022 was a challenging year from a financial perspective. While we returned to programing as usual, we did so without the government Covid-19 grant support that proved so vital for 2020 and 2021. While audiences were still engaged with the AGA, generating revenues from special events, food service/catering and memberships continued to be a challenge, I would like to express sincere thanks to the public funders and the ongoing sponsors that continued to support the AGA this year, as well the new sponsors who joined the AGA family in 2022.

I would also like to thank every donor who made a financial contribution to the AGA and supported our growth through artwork donations for the collection. I would also like to express our sincere gratitude to the many people, AGA Members, Curator's Circle and Director's Circle Members, private donors and AGA Always Endowment Campaign supporters who gave so generously to the AGA this year.

In closing, I would like to thank all the AGA staff, many of whom are new to the AGA in the last 2 years, and others who have been with the AGA for many years. All your contributions are recognized and valued. In particular, I would like to acknowledge the management team: Dara Armsden, Alice Leung, Ashton Raeyr, Mike Slywka and Pat St. Arnaud, who have been working hard to ensure the success of the present AGA and who are helping to build the Gallery for the future. The AGA Board of Directors and the Endowment Campaign Committee, both under the leadership of Leon Zupan, provide guidance and support for the AGA team, and I am very grateful for their time, oversight and incredible commitment. We are looking forward to 2023, with a full and exciting year of exhibitions, program and events and the planning for our 100th anniversary in 2024.

TREX

The Alberta Foundation for the Arts Travelling Exhibition Program. Organized by the Art Gallery of Alberta.

The Travelling Exhibition Program (TREX) was established in 1981 by the Alberta Foundation for the Arts (AFA) with the vision that every Albertan would have the opportunity to experience visual art exhibitions in their own communities. The TREX program is a coordinated effort between the AFA and the Art Gallery of Grande Prairie, Grande Prairie (TREX Region 1); the Art Gallery of Alberta, Edmonton (TREX Region 2); The Alberta Society of Artists, Calgary (TREX Region 3); and the Esplanade Arts & Heritage Centre, Medicine Hat (TREX Region 4).

The AGA has managed the TREX program for north central and northeastern Alberta (TREX Region 2) since 1986. In March 2018, the AFA awarded the AGA management of the TREX program for another five years (2018–2023). In December of 2022 the AFA offered the AGA management of the TREX program in north central and northeastern Alberta (TREX Region 2) for the 2023-2024 season.

We are the access points to current exhibitions and hands-on artmaking that empower all members of our community to transform their lives with curiosity and play.

The teacher and school programs connect teachers and students to big ideas through various programming formats and access points, including in-person and virtual exhibition visits, studio projects, professional development sessions and online resources.

Family Programs

Family programs provide opportunities for families to connect to exhibitions through art explorations focused on play, hands-on art-making and exciting in-gallery experiences.

Stroller Tours

Stroller Tours are in-depth tours of a current exhibition offered once per month to parents with new babies. With added flexibility, caregivers can learn about art in a safe space where babies can be babies and parents can interact with other parents.

Art Classes and Camps

Offered throughout the year, Art Classes and Camps are for children ages 6-12 and youth ages 13-17 to hone their visual literacy, critical thinking and artmaking skills. Each class or camp features close-looking activities and discussion, unique art projects and material explorations.

Weekend Art Classes

Weekend Art Classes feature a wealth of opportunities for students to explore their creativity including investigative gallery visits and process-led art projects inspired by featured exhibitions. Weekend Art Classes are led by professional artists/educators and are focused on experimentation, risk-taking and participation in a dynamic studio setting. **Total number of programs: 7 Total number of participants: 43**

ArtBreak Camps

ArtBreak Camps are offered during the spring, summer and winter school breaks. Students take the lead in these exploratory programs to discover the world around them through art activities, exercises and projects related to specific themes. Focusing on student interactions and personal experiences, these camps create bridges between art, ideas and the community.

Community Outreach

Community Outreach activities foster engagement beyond our regular programming schedule and include partnerships with community organizations and activities off-site and in the community.

Art Hive

Art Hive is a weekly community-based artmaking initiative that is open to all and welcomes participants as artists. Partnering with the St. Stephen's College Art Therapy program at the University of Alberta, Art Hive is a safe(r) and inclusive space that uses artmaking as a tool for collaboration, dialogue, skill-sharing and community engagement for people across different cultural and socio-economic backgrounds, ages and abilities. No art training or experience is required to participate.

Enterprise and Visitor Experience

Acting as "the face of the AGA", Enterprise and Visitor Experience creates a warm, inclusive and welcoming environment for our guests, clients, customers and Members. By marrying the attributes of its 3 programs (Guest Services, Art Sales & Rental, and shopAGA), Enterprise reaches into Alberta's creative community and helps build sustainable financial opportunities for artists and makers while attracting visitors to Edmonton's downtown.

Guest Services

As the first point of contact for most visitors to the AGA, the Guest Services desk plays an integral role in ensuring visitors enjoy their time at the Gallery. Guest Services operates as the verification of the admissions attendance, but also serves as a hub of information for visitors, clients and artists.

To build on human resource efficiencies and to encourage professional development for our team, Enterprise Associates were cross trained in 2022 between their primary role and Guest Services. This provided all Enterprise staff with a better understanding of our Members, clients and visitors. As a result, every Associate has the confidence and competence to provide timely responses to inquiries whether by phone, email or in-person.

With COVID-19 continuing to impact the health, safety and comfort of our patrons and staff, Guest Services continues to monitor and enforce provincial and federal health and safety initiatives in addition to their regular duties.

Art Sales and Rental

The longest-running program of its kind in Alberta, Art Sales and Rental (AS&R) enables the public to enjoy art in their homes and offices at a reasonable cost while supporting Alberta artists.

For the public, the Art Sales and Rental Gallery creates an accessible avenue to encounter thousands of artworks in every medium, which, in turn, builds understanding of and greater appreciation for Alberta art and artists.

This unique program supports Alberta artists through remuneration for artwork sold and rented. It also provides a high-profile platform for artists to promote their bodies of work both physically and virtually.

In 2022, AS&R

- Represented 161 artists
- Carried 1,600 artworks available for rent and purchase
- Rented an average of 154 artworks each month by 75 artists to 37 clients

Recognizing the importance of stewarding Alberta's next generation of cultural workers, Art Sales & Rental hosted 3 field placements from the Grant McEwan University Arts & Cultural Management Program. In this 280-hour program, students were given meaningful learning opportunities and real-world culture-sector work experience that included retail/rental operations and management, art handling, client and visitor relations, and basic curatorial practices, including art installation.

To bolster its profile, AS&R invited its artists to participate in additional outreach activities, including *Mosaic*, a Community Gallery exhibition which featured 101 artworks by 84 artists. AS&R also partnered with Manulife Place, an upscale shopping and office building in Downtown Edmonton, for their seasonal activation which engaged 10 artists from both AS&R and shopAGA to paint/illustrate and design one-of-a-kind holiday trees live and on-site at Manulife Place.

shopAGA

shopAGA is committed to featuring well-crafted, interesting, original, culturally significant and locally made small-batch, studio-made selections that enhance every visitor's art experience. Amplifying the "shop local" anthem, shopAGA celebrates our provincial identity through the lens of artists and makers. Located in the heart of Edmonton, shopAGA encourages local shopping by attracting shoppers to downtown. And with the AGA contributing its credibility, more artists and makers seek to be a part of this growing enterprise. This translates to more options for customers, making their shopping experience more interesting and diverse.

Equity Committee

Formed in October 2020, the Equity Committee focuses on advancing the AGA's commitment to inclusion, diversity, equity and accessibility (IDEA).

The Committee consists of five full-time staff and five part-time staff. While serving as the ex-officio, the Executive Director participates in committee meetings to offer guidance and advice.

Three sub-committees were set up to lead the work:

- Accessibility, focusing on making the AGA more accessible to staff and visitors
- **Community Outreach**, focusing on creating connections with diverse segments in the community
- Staff Training, focusing on equipping AGA staff with knowledge and tools

Accomplishments by the Equity Committee include:

- These roundtables were structured around three questions:
 - Experiences with the AGA
 - What an inclusive and equitable relationship can and should look like
 - Challenges to participation and recommendations for moving forward.
- These sessions included participants from across Alberta, including Calgary, Edmonton, Fort McMurray, Grande Prairie, Lac La Biche and Lethbridge.
- Participants represented artists, galleries, artist-run-centres, art councils and non-profit organizations serving disabled artists, the Two Spirit community, and IBPOC artists, youth and culture workers.
- Two Staff Training Workshops:
 - Norquest College Inclusion at Work was a self-paced, online course that offered practical inclusion skills through five modules.
 - Voices of Albertans with Disabilities: A Discussion on Disability was a webinar on awareness for accommodating people with mobility challenges.
- Alberta Biennial for Contemporary Art Survey, a survey related to the history and future of the Alberta Biennial exhibition that was released online in 2022. With the results, we developed a new curatorial process based on a public call for submissions.

- Art Industry Night happened in November was a community outreach and networking event with local artists.
- Building Accessibility Audit (part one) was about assessing the AGA on its accessibility.

The Committee will continue the work for advancing the AGA's commitment to IDEA in 2023.

Marketing

Throughout 2022, Marketing continued to position the AGA as the hub for the visual arts by growing our brand affinity, increasing community partnership and promoting our exhibitions, events, education programs, shopAGA and Art Sales and Rental. We saw increased audiences, community engagement and visitation in 2022.
