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Celebrating 100 Years!

1924: The Spark of an Idea

With a goal to develop a permanent collection of art for Edmontonians, the Edmonton Art Club, the Edmonton Art Association and the Local Council of Women come together to help create the Edmonton Museum of Arts - under the leadership of Maud Bowman. The Museum is stationed within the Edmonton Public Library's first location at 100th Avenue and 100th Street.

1943: Direction and Volunteerism

Dr. Robert Hedley is appointed the museum's second director, prioritizing the expansion of the Gallery's Art Education program and interest in the visual arts. 1943 also marks the creation of the Women's Society of the Edmonton Museum of Arts, a core volunteer group that oversees many of the museum's activities - interpretive programming, membership engagement, fundraising initiatives and commercial enterprise.

1952: Acquiring Space to Grow

The Museum finds its next home in the renovated former residence of the Secord family, a building transferred to the city after the death of Annie Secord in 1951. At Secord House, the museum finally has space to display its collection, conduct art classes and rent space.

1969: New Name, New Building

The Edmonton Art Gallery (renamed from the Edmonton Museum of Arts in 1956) finds its permanent home in the Arthur Blow Condell Memorial Building, purpose-built with appropriate environmental controls to take on more ambitious travelling exhibitions. This building is made possible by a large donation bequeathed by Mrs. Abigail Edith Condell, in the name of her late son, and local architecture firm Bittorf-Wensley.

1975: A Growing Collection

The Ernest E. Poole Foundation donates 90 artworks to the EAG's growing collection of historical Canadian art, including artworks by the Group of Seven, Tom Thomson, Emily Carr, Cornelius Krieghoff, Jean-Paul Riopelle, Fredrick Arthur Verner and Laura Muntz Lyall among others. The Poole donation remains the most significant contribution to the Gallery's collection to date.

1996: Biennial Beginnings

The Edmonton Art Gallery co-hosts its first Alberta Biennial in partnership with the Glenbow Museum, a showcase of contemporary art by Alberta artists across the province. Presented at both locations and curated by Bruce Grenville (EAG) and Catharine Mastin (Glenbow), the exhibition enhances the dialogue amongst various regions, communities and urban centres.

2005: A New Chapter

Randall Stout, a Los Angeles-based architect, wins an international architecture competition and is selected to design the updated gallery building. The announcement of the winning architect is paired with the unveiling of the Edmonton Art Gallery's new name, The Art Gallery of Alberta, to reflect the Gallery's growing ambitions to become a cultural hub and guardian of Alberta's artistic and cultural heritage.

2007: Construction Begins

The Art Gallery of Alberta transports their operations temporarily to Enterprise Square for holding as construction begins on the new building.

2010: A Dream Realized

Construction concludes on the new Art Gallery of Alberta building, with around 10,000 guests attending the grand opening. A stark contrast to the former building, Stout's design took inspiration from the natural surroundings of the gallery, letting the curves of the North Saskatchewan and aurora borealis inform the flowing, organic design of the architecture.

2024: A Century of Art

Marking 100 years of exhibitions, classes and community, the AGA is now known for award-winning exhibitions and innovative programming - continuing its tradition of being a keystone institution in the city and province.

Founded by women for a lifetime of inspiration

Women played integral roles in the founding of what is now known as the Art Gallery of Alberta, blazing a trail for a century to come.

In 1924, Maud Bowman founded the Edmonton Museum of Arts (now the AGA) and dedicated herself to securing support for the gallery. Maud Bowman's participation in the Women's Musical Club and the local branch of the Women's Art Association connected her to a national network of women interested in the arts and to the Local Council of Women, lending her the political influence necessary to rally support in establishing the city's first museum. Passionate about art education, she established children's art classes in 1934 which continue to this day in the AGA's Education program.

Despite her substantial contributions, Maud Bowman never received a salary. It was not until much later that the gallery acknowledged her efforts, dedicating a gallery space in her honour in 1978.

Other key women in the founding of the AGA include:

- Lady Aberdeen, vice-regal consort to Governor General John Hamilton-Gordon in the 1890s, who championed women's rights and the arts, helping to establish the National Council of Women in Canada and a local chapter in Edmonton
- Dorothy Dyde, Edmonton Art Gallery board member and a key patron whose focused collection policy shaped the gallery's direction
- Anna Wells, founder of the Women's Society who raised public interest and funds for the museum
- Abigail Edith Condell, whose generous donation to the gallery supported the construction of a new building named after her late son - the Arthur Blow Condell Memorial Building

• Barbara Poole, designer, philanthropist and avid supporter of the arts, whose seed donation to the AGA through the John and Barbara Poole Family Fund launched the campaign for the construction of the new building and the establishment of the Poole Centre of Design. The Poole family continues to support the AGA to this day.

We are building momentum for further donations through the end of 2026. If you have not already done so, I hope you will consider making a donation that will assist us in sustaining your AGA for the next 100 years. At the end of the year, we also received a matching pledge from the Edmonton Community Foundation (ECF) potentially up to \$500,000. We thank them for their commitment to the AGA and other non-profit organizations in our city.

The success of this past year would not be possible without the leadership of our Executive Director and Chief Curator, Catherine Crowston, as well as the efforts of her hardworking and inspiring team of employees and volunteers. This past year, which included many of our special anniversary exhibitions and events, was one of our busiest years since the opening of our building. On behalf of our Board, thank you for allowing us to achieve 100 years of artistic excellence. We are all looking forward to where we can go from here.

Message from the Executive Director

In 2024 the Art Gallery of Alberta celebrated our 100th anniversary. Founded on August 18, 1924, the AGA is proud to be the oldest cultural institution in the Province of Alberta.

This past century has been a long and wondrous journey, for an organization that began as the vision of one Edmontonian, Maud Bowman. We are so happy to have celebrated this major milestone with our many Members and friends in Alberta and across the country.

The anniversary year commenced with a special exhibition of Alberta women artists presented offsite at the Edmonton YWCA. The exhibition also celebrated the important contribution of women to building the AGA. From our founding Director, Maud Bowman to the contributions of hundreds of artists, curators and philanthropists, the AGA is indebted to many, many visionary, generous and committed women.

We started this momentous year at the AGA with the pairing of two major solo exhibitions featuring the work of Edmonton artists whose artistic contributions have been acclaimed both at home and internationally. Through painting and ceramic sculpture, Emmanuel Osahor captures the ever-changing nature of gardens, in which everything is always in process and there is an ongoing balance between the haphazard and the arduous pursuit of perfection. In Brenda Draney's exhibition *Drink from the River*, the artist delves into complexity of the representation of intimacy. Creating images culled from her archive of memories, she creates works that recall the people and moments that shaped her lived experience.

In February we opened the major exhibition, *Tom Thomson: North Star*, a tribute to this important Canadian artist, organized and toured by the McMichael Canadian Art Collection. Alberta audiences were able to see major works that traced the artist's working process and connection to the land. Simultaneously, the exhibition of a new installation by Braxton Garneau, entitled *Pay Dirt*, gave a surreal glimpse of the landscapes created by the oil industry in Northern Alberta and the artist's familial homeland of Trinidad. The question of our experience with the land was also addressed in Dwayne Martineau's immense photographic mural created for the main hall, *Boreal Fortress*. Using images of trees, bark, weeds and detritus from our aspen parkland ecosystem, the installation's massive scale and uncanny mirroring effect makes the trees feel strange yet familiar.

In spring, the AGA produced an exhibition featuring the photographic work of Meryl McMaster and Aïda Muluneh, entitled *Ebb and Flow*. Meryl McMaster's self-portraits, in which the artist assumes characters or animal personas in elaborate costume were presented with Aïda Muluneh's dream-

like images that often touch on Ethiopian history and culture. Both artists create works that are complex, historically informed and nuanced, images that reference moments from recent memories, family stories, to deep pre-human histories.

Beginning in May, curatorial activities were focused on sharing the history of the AGA and of art in Alberta, as part of the AGA's centennial. As a central part of this, a series of connected exhibitions was developed to feature our collection and to celebrate art and artists in Alberta over 100 years. The AGA curatorial team worked together to curate four connected exhibitions of Alberta art, from the 1920s to the present day. The exhibitions addressed themes recurrent in Alberta art and included over 200 Alberta artists in all media. Grouped together as *AGA100: Act 1, 2* and *3*, these three serial exhibitions were titled: *Earth to Eternity; Landscape to Land Use;* and *Words to Worldmaking.* Exploring themes such as land, landscape and land use; abstraction and infinity; the people and communities that comprise our province, together the exhibition, *Knowledge Made Concrete: 100 Years of Teaching and Collecting,* opened in 2025, as a special partnership with the Illingworth Kerr Gallery at the Alberta University of the Arts in Calgary. Artists are the backbone of the AGA, and we acknowledge the important contributions of all those featured in our exhibitions and all those who choose to live and make art in our province.

Two additional exhibitions also looked at significant moments in the AGA's history. The exhibition, *1924: Edmonton and the Beginnings of the AGA*, looked at what our city looked like at the time of our founding. In 1975, the AGA was gifted a large and significant collection of Canadian art, donated by the Ernest E. Poole Foundation. This group of 90 paintings and sculptures became the cornerstone of the AGA's collection of Canadian historical art. The gifts featured work by Group of Seven artists such as Lawren Harris, Arthur Lismer, J.E.H. MacDonald and Frederick Varley as well as works by other luminaries of art in Canada: Emily Carr, David Milne, James Wilson Morrice, Tom Thomson amongst many others. The exhibition, *A Lasting Legacy*, featured the artworks in this legacy of the Poole family and commemorated their contributions to the AGA and art in Alberta.

The long history of the AGA – as with all public galleries and museums – is interconnected with the lives and histories of individuals who love and collect art. As part of the AGA's 100th anniversary celebrations, this exhibition brings together more than 75 works of art on loan from private art collections across Alberta. Featuring a selection of works as varied as the collecting visions as the people who have lent them, *A Look Within* provides a view into the wide range of approaches, passions and interests that drive practices of collecting. Supported by Canadian Western Bank, the AGA gratefully acknowledges the generosity and support of all of the lenders to this exhibition



Throughout the year, we formed partnerships with organizations across Alberta to share art more broadly from and with the community. February brought with it the celebration of the work of 5 Artists 1 Love. For over 15 years, the AGA's partnership with this important community organization has enabled us to feature new works by a diverse group of artists of African heritage. Collaboratively organized by the AGA and the Nina Haggerty Centre, the exhibition *Wavy Dimension* brought together artworks created by Aaron Harvey and Boyd Dymchuk. Our partnership with the Africa Centre envisioned an exhibition, Aliya Logun's *Portraiture of Black Youth*, which served as a time capsule, representing the infinite nature of youth self-expression. At the end of the year, the exhibition, as with other AGA anniversary exhibitions, looked to the past and its impacts on the present and future —in this case, through a photographic tribute to Alberta survivors of the Holocaust.

In addition to exhibitions presented on site, in 2024 the AGA produced and toured 5 new exhibitions of contemporary art in 35 communities across Central and Northern Alberta. In 2024, over 154,000 people across Alberta experienced contemporary art exhibitions in their own communities. The AGA's Art Sales and Rental Gallery also worked to organize exhibitions each year in collaboration with non-profit community arts organizations. AS&R currently represents over 120 Alberta artists and provides income for living artists through a revenue-sharing agreement.

Another component of AGA core activities is the collection of over 6,600 works of art. Significant acquisitions have been made to the collection over the last few years, to address the historical lack of representation of Indigenous, First Nations, Métis and Inuit artists in the collection. Much of our success in building exhibitions and a collection representative of Indigenous knowledge and creativity is guided by the work of Indigenous curators. At the end of the year, we achieved an important strategic plan objective of fostering Indigenous curatorial expertise at the AGA with the appointment of Alaynee Goodwill-Littlechild as the first full-time Curator of Indigenous Creativity, thanks to the support of TD.

Throughout 2024 we developed numerous programs to engage with diverse cultural communities in Alberta through expanded language initiatives; community advisory committees; community-led tours and augmented programming for new citizens. Our seniors' program, Aging Artfully, received national recognition through a Canadian Museums Association award for programming. The year also featured numerous 100th anniversary specific programming initiatives, both inside the building and across the City.

Our 100th Birthday party on Churchill Square attracted over 5,000 people who enjoyed free admission, art activities, live performances, a special anniversary art market as well as cake. To close the year, we hosted a special, once-in-a-life time anniversary gala, The Century Ball. What a celebration it was, with a finely crafted dinner, marvelous music, a live figure drawing studio and a late night party.

2024 continued to be a challenging year, however, from a financial perspective. Despite this, we were thrilled with the engagement of so many people who showed how important the AGA continues to be as a cultural hub for our city and province. I would like to express our sincere thanks to all of those who so generously gave to the AGA's anniversary campaign, AGA Always. Your contributions made such a difference in this year, and for years to come. A special thank you to the Edmonton Community Foundation, who approved a potential match of up to \$500,000, for new donations to the campaign.

The AGA relies on the goodwill of so many people to operate each year, and we would like to acknowledge the donors who made financial and in-kind contributions to support AGA operations now and in the future. The Poole Centre of Design, funded by the Poole Family Foundation through the Edmonton Community Foundation, continued to be a key AGA funder of inspiring programming focussed on the intersection of art and design.

Our most sincere gratitude is given to the many people, AGA Members, Curator's Circle and Director's Circle Members, private donors and all our supporters who gave so generously to the AGA this year. This includes those who donated works of art to help us grow our permanent collection. Thank you as well to the ongoing corporate sponsors who continued to support the AGA this year, as well as all of our new supporters who joined the AGA family in 2024.

I would like to thank all the AGA staff and volunteers for their contributions over the past year. In particular, I would like to recognize the management team: Dara Armsden, Courtney Higgins, Trina Johnson, Mike Slywka and Pat St. Arnaud, who work hard every day to ensure the success of the AGA. Special thanks are extended to all of the AGA staff, everyone of whom who took on extra responsibilities and projects this year in order to make our 100th anniversary a year to remember. Thank you all!

The AGA Board of Directors and the AGA Always committee continue to provide guidance and support for the AGA team, and their work is most sincerely appreciated. In closing, I would like to express my most sincere thanks to Leon Zupan, Chair of the AGA Board of Directors for his dedicated leadership and tireless commitment to the AGA and building for our future. He has provided his knowledge, wisdom and support as Chair for the last 5 years, in times of both uncertainty and celebration.

We offer teacher and school programs; family programs; art classes and camps; youth programs and initiatives; adult programs; and community outreach. We provide various access points to current exhibitions and hands-on artmaking that empower all members of our community to transform their lives with curiosity and play.

Equity Committee

In 2024, the Equity Committee supported initiatives in community engagement and staff training, including

- Whisper mics as a regular feature of our tour program. The mics allow visitors to listen to the tour guide without straining to hear and block out the ambient noise in the exhibition spaces that could be distracting.
- Partnering with CARFAC Alberta to develop a series of professional development and networking events for artists in our community. The latest event was specifically designed for artists from marginalized communities. We leveraged our contacts at CARFAC, Edmonton Arts Council, Alberta Foundation for the Arts and others to ensure that artists had an opportunity to network with people at these organizations and assembled a team of ambassadors to facilitate conversations.
- The development of a prototype onboarding module for new staff. This module offers a broad introduction to equity themes and concepts, ensuring that all new hires have a foundational understanding of these topics. The module includes a glossary of terms, an inclusive language guide, and articles on identifying racism, facilitating difficult conversations and understanding bias and privilege.

Marketing

Throughout 2024, Marketing and Communications had the pleasure of promoting AGA100 events, exhibitions and programming, both organically and through multiple partnerships. In addition, we championed the launch of the AGA's new website, designed to improve user experience and maintain the AGA's profile as Alberta's hub of arts and culture.

Enterprise and Visitor Experience

Acting as "the face of the AGA", Enterprise and Visitor Experience creates a warm and welcoming environment for our guests, clients, customers and members. By marrying the attributes of its four programs: Guest Services, Art Sales & Rental, the Community Gallery, and shopAGA, Enterprise & Visitor Experience reaches into Alberta's creative community and helps build sustainable financial opportunities for artists and makers while attracting visitors to Edmonton's downtown.

Guest Services

As the first point of contact for most visitors to the AGA, the Guest Services desk serves as a hub of information, ensuring visitors, clients, and artists enjoy their time at the Gallery. Guest Services fulfills several integral functions, including admissions processing, daily attendance tracking, conducting surveys, recording visitor feedback, and selling and updating memberships.

By providing ongoing training and streamlining daily processes, our Guest Services Associates are equipped to manage a perpetually dynamic stream of traffic while ensuring the exceptional level of personal service we strive to provide all visitors. In 2024, this service included complimentary and mandatory coat check services during the runs of special exhibitions that required additional security provisions.

In 2024, growth in membership purchases and renewals continued to be a focus for the AGA. Understanding how a positive member experience can enhance loyalty, encourage continued involvement and create word-of-mouth advocates, the Guest Services team connected with new and returning members, helping to shape our members' positive touch-point experiences be it with enrollment, visitation, or renewal.

Furthering its role in admissions, the Guest Services team implemented the launch of AGA's new Top-Up initiative, which invited visitors to round-up their entrance fees. This point-of-sales donation incentive was an effective way for visitors to show their support of the gallery through small, manageable contributions which collectively translate to a significant monetary impact over time. Since its implementation in August 2024, this new initiative collected \$1,923 in these micro-donations.



Art Sales & Rental

The longest-running program of its kind in Alberta, Art Sales & Rental enables the public to enjoy art in their homes and offices at a reasonable cost. This vital program supports Alberta artists through remuneration for artwork sold and rented. It also provides a highprofile platform through which professional artists can promote their bodies of work both physically and virtually. For the visitor, the Art Sales & Rental Gallery creates an accessible avenue to encounter thousands of artworks in every medium, which in turn, builds understanding of and greater appreciation for Alberta art and artists.

In 2024, Art Sales & Rental:

- Presented over 1,680 artworks available for rent and purchase
- Rented an average of 89 artworks each month by 60 artists to 34 clients
- Sold 72 works to 50 clients

With the entire collection of available artworks showcased on our website, potential clients and buyers can actively search for their next acquisition from the comfort of their home, or request a viewing of specified artworks in our showroom during regular gallery hours.

Community Gallery

An impactful initiative of the Art Sales & Rental program, the Community Gallery supports local community groups who are interested in curating and producing diverse art exhibitions with the intention of selling their artworks. Through this initiative, the AGA provides a venue for these retail exhibitions and supports their production, installation and promotion. Undertaken in a spirit of collaboration, openness and knowledge sharing, the Community Gallery space features up to five exhibitions per year and is always free to the public with all exhibited artworks available for sale.

In 2024, under the administration of Art Sales & Rental, the Community Gallery showcased 5 exhibitions: *In Focus, Creating Beauty, Artist Proof, Fair Weather: Equality, Community and Climate Change* and (*y*)*Our AGA*. Combined, these five exhibitions featured 226 artworks by 104 Alberta established, mid-career and emerging artists.

shopAGA

Attracting visitors to the heart of downtown Edmonton, shopAGA is an integral part of our creative community. Celebrating Alberta's provincial identity through the lens of the maker, shopAGA is committed to featuring well-crafted, original, culturally significant and locally sourced, small-batch, studio-made selections that complement AGA gallery exhibitions.

shopAGA is more than a retail destination. It is an important part of an artist's diverse, whole-career professional practice. shopAGA's retail and marketing opportunities serve as an important component to an artist's larger career scope by supporting their revenue-generation streams and providing a platform on which to build profile in support of their artistic identity. With a selection of over 1,000 pieces of art, fine-craft and design created by 147 artists, designers and makers, shopAGA ensures underrepresented communities are provided opportunities to sell their works. In 2024, shopAGA vendor-identified representation included:

- 22 new vendors
- 79% Albertan
- 18% Indigenous
- 5% persons of colour
- 6% new citizens
- 59% female-led business
- 2% LGBTQ+
- 10% senior (65+ years)
- 5% Francophone

Celebrating AGA's centennial year, shopAGA featured several exclusive lines of merchandise to help build awareness of the longevity of the AGA's presence in our province as well as tell its narrative through the skilled hands of the maker. A local chocolate maker created flavoured bars inspired by the decades; a leather worker designed card wallets embossed with a linedrawing of the iconic AGA building; an Indigenous ceramic artist hand-built plates inspired by the AGA's interior lattice work; an embroidery artist created a limited edition embroidery kit featuring a floral interpretation of the iconic AGA building; and a local antique collector showcased selected antique and vintage treasures to give visitors a taste of what was worn and carried throughout the decades. And with our selection of vintage exhibition catalogues resurrected, visitors were reminded of just how much was created in a hundred years!

Each year, shopAGA attracts more artists, designers, makers and writers who seek to be a part of this growing enterprise. As our catalog of creators grow, so do the buying selections for our customers, enhancing the gallery experience and making one's shopping excursion more interesting and culturally diverse.

For the 100th Anniversary Year, a core team of 153 volunteers provided essential support to AGA special events, exhibitions and programming. Over 1,537 hours, they generously gave their time, enthusiasm and dedication.

From our founding in 1924, volunteers have played a crucial role in the art gallery's formation.
