Though this past season is almost over, however, a new one 'looms on the horizon'. TREX Region 2 thanks all who booked with us for the 2023-2024 season and in this edition of *sightlines*, it is our pleasure to take a peek at what is coming your way this September!

As expressed in a previous edition of *sightlines*, the wonder of a piece of art often lies in where it can take and what it can teach the viewer. For me personally, the 'magic' of art is that it allows me to encounter worlds, ideas and situations which have the potential to expand my personal universes and enable me to become more than what I may be. This function of art - to take the viewer on a journey and experience the world from perspectives other than one's own - is behind the art work included in the upcoming exhibition *Cradle*.

Canada is a young country but many who settle here come from regions which lay claim to being sites of the oldest civilizations on earth: regions known as 'cradles of civilization' which, throughout their long and tumultuous histories, provided many of the building blocks upon which contemporary societies rest.

The Travelling Exhibition Cradle presents the work of three artists, currently residing in Edmonton, who originally come from regions associated with cradles of civilization in the Middle East and South-East Asia. Arriving in Canada as economic immigrants or refugees from war and conflict, each of these artists is a story teller, sharing in their artworks ancient and rich cultural histories and legacies. While concerned with specific places and people in their works, however, these artists also strive to address more universal concerns to demonstrate that, regardless of where people come from, we are all one people with similar dreams and desires.

The aims expressed above are seen in the artwork of Aboud Salman. Originally from Syria, Salman's complex artworks are composed of symbolic references to the culture and history of his homeland and to his newfound home in Alberta. This is seen in the painting Civilization of Yemen which has, as a unifying theme, the idea of home and construction. As expressed by the artist, this painting represents the civilization of Yemen, the cradle of civilization in the Arabian Peninsula, and various aspects of civilizations in Canada/ North America. Within the Arabic window frame the viewer can discern a tower on a mountain. This references the fact that in ancient Yemen buildings were built on tops of mountains. Around this tower are also various symbols from Yemen, such as the Yemeni Jambiya (a kind of traditional knife) as well as representations of Yemeni folk dances. Salman also makes a comparison between Yemeni and Canadian construction, drawing a Canadian house built of wood near the bottom of the composition and, above this house, representations of teepees used by Indigenous peoples. Inside the house there are many details that symbolize things loved by the artist and his family. In the eastern window he wrote the names of his wife and children in Yemeni cuneiform as well as the names of the places he loves such as his

hometown, Al Mayadin; his home country, Syria; as well as the Canadian welcoming phrase, 'Canada welcomes you',

A second exhibition set to start travelling in September is the exhibition *Women Gone Wild!* Since the dawn of human history animal imagery has been an aspect of humankinds' cultural repertoire. While animals have long been a viable subject for visual artists, however, in the annals of Euro-North American art history any exploration of wild animals that has been undertaken has almost exclusively been the domain of male artists. Beginning in the 20th century this began to change as the roles of women in society broadened.

The TREX Exhibition *Women Gone Wild!* explores the subject of wild creatures as they are expressed in the work of three contemporary women artists from Edmonton. Featuring works by Cynthia Fuhrer, Jenny Keith and Samantha Walrod, the depictions of wild creatures presented range from realistic representations to more abstract and surrealistic impressions. These artists also demonstrate diverse reasons for choosing their subjects. Whatever their artistic approach and intentions, however, all three artists reveal a love and respect for nature in their works and through them invite viewers to 'go wild' as well.

'Going wild' is definitely an aim expressed by artist Jenny Keith in her works in the exhibition *Women Gone Wild!*

For the exhibition *Women Gone Wild!* Keith, who works in series in her art practice, explores both the subject of animals and the title of the exhibition itself. As she indicates, she likes painting human figures so it makes sense with the title to paint women. There is, however, a deeper message behind this. As eloquently expressed by this artist:

The title "Women Gone Wild" at first glance might raise some eyebrows, but it's a pretty perfect name for an exhibition of work by women artists who are inspired by wilderness. While the title may be a little cheeky, I love it because it allows us to reframe what it means to be a "wild woman" and take it back in a feminist context. Understandably, your first thought upon hearing the title may jump to a certain series of adult films, but in this series of artwork, we suggest that women should be free to "go wild" in any way we choose, and if perhaps you scowl or blush at the notion - that's on you. Until relatively recently the art world has been dominated by men and women (if permitted to paint at all) were expected to create pretty domestic works, perhaps of flowers or still lives, likely with the most fearsome beast in the artwork being a poorly tempered house pet. We are now free to choose any subject that tickles our fancy, and we have chosen the wild natural world.

All the women/girls in Keith's works for the exhibition are women she knows and there is thus a 'backstory' to each work. Keith is also painting women with animals/insects that are considered phobias or creepy and placing both in situations where the presence of the 'animal' is not minded or, at the least, tolerated. For the artist, such a 'pairing' gives the women even more strength and power than is often considered. As stated by Keith:

In this series, I have created images portraying women with animals that are common phobias or at least typically considered creepy and undesireable. The arguably 'unladylike' women in my paintings have embraced these creatures in the hopes that perhaps the viewer may look upon them in a slightly kinder context.
